

DIVISIONS

Support Services

Support Services Division (SSD) is commanded by Captain Antonia McDaniel. The division is responsible for supporting the Department as a whole. The division is comprised of both sworn and non-sworn personnel and handles many areas of operations within the department, such as, vehicle fuel, maintenance, utility bills, building maintenance and a host of other responsibilities.

In addition to keeping things running, the Division has some focused centric units to help support other Divisions with various needs. These are:

- Records Management
- Intelligence Unit
- Office of Management and Budget



DIVISIONS

Criminal Investigation

The Criminal Investigation Division (CID) is commanded by Captain Anthony Lourence. Five specialized units comprise CID. Those units are the Robbery-Homicide Unit, Special Victims Unit, Organized Crime Unit, General Investigations Unit and Property Crimes Unit. In addition to the mission to conduct criminal investigations, the CID provides Victim Services through the Crime Victim's Liaison Office, and also operates the Sex Offender Registration Office.

In 2022, 3,849 investigations were conducted.

The CID increased involvement with training using technology by increasing the use of the National Integrated Ballistic Information Network (NIBIN) to help advance criminal offenses involving firearms.

Continued and expanded Victims Services by providing counseling and emergency food and shelter for 1,640 victims of crime.

Engaged with the community by facilitation and participating in events such as the 2nd Annual Walk for Domestic Violence.




DIVISIONS

Patrol

The Patrol Division is commanded by Captain Ronnie Supak Jr. The division is responsible for providing uniformed first responder coverage for the city, 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

The division consists of TRU, Communications, Jail and Operations along with the specialized SWAT Team, Violent Crime Action Team, Bike Patrol and K9 Support Units.



COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT UNIT

The Community Engagement Unit is assigned to the Patrol Division and primarily provides direct connection to the downtown community by providing a regular police presence, addressing problems in the downtown area, assisting and providing resources for homeless in our communities, and engaging in other downtown community activities.

The CEU collaborates with a variety of community groups to meet a wide range of community needs, including community engagement programs, training on safety and crime prevention, and other community services.

DIVISIONS

Training

The Training Division is commanded by Captain Robert Rush. The division is responsible for recruiting and hiring of both police officers and civilian staff. Recruiting is a team effort primarily executed by the Recruiter.

The Personnel and Training Lieutenant is the Department's Training Coordinator. He is responsible for all training at the department level-both basic training and in-service training. He also serves as the department's range master.


The KPD Academy Training Center is licensed by the Texas Commission on Law Enforcement (TCOLE.)









LAW ENFORCEMENT CODE OF ETHICS

As a law enforcement officer, my fundamental duty is to serve the community; to safeguard lives and property; to protect the innocent against deception, the weak against oppression or intimidation and the peaceful against violence or disorder; and to respect the constitutional rights of all to liberty, equality and justice.

I will keep my private life unsullied as an example to all and will behave in a manner that does not bring discredit to me or to my agency. I will maintain courageous calm in the face of danger, scorn or ridicule; develop self-restraint; and be constantly mindful of the welfare of others. Honest in thought and deed both in my personal and official life, I will be exemplary in obeying the law and the regulations of my department. Whatever I see or hear of a confidential nature or that is confided to me in my official capacity will be kept ever secret unless revelation is necessary in the performance of my duty.

I will never act officiously or permit personal feelings, prejudices, political beliefs, aspirations, animosities or friendships to influence my decisions. With no compromise for crime and with relentless prosecution of criminals, I will enforce the law courteously and appropriately without fear or favor, malice or ill will, never employing unnecessary force or violence and never accepting gratuities.

I recognize the badge of my office as a symbol of public faith, and I accept it as a public trust to be held so long as I am true to the ethics of police service. I will never engage in acts of corruption or bribery, nor will I condone such acts by other police officers. I will cooperate with all legally authorized agencies and their representatives in the pursuit of justice.

I know that I alone am responsible for my own standard of professional performance and will take every reasonable opportunity to enhance and improve my level of knowledge and competence.

I will constantly strive to achieve these objectives and ideals, dedicating myself before God to my chosen profession... law enforcement.
